

## 9th June New Zealand Vs Bangladesh ICC Champions Trophy

This fixture was a very important game for Bangladesh as they had to win to have any chance of getting into the semi-finals where they would play either India or South Africa. New Zealand were everyone's favourites to win the game but Bangladesh thrive under pressure.

New Zealand got off to a good start with their opening batsmen Martin Guptill and Luke Ronchi, with Guptill hitting a six out of the ground. However, Bangladesh got both opening batsmen out in the first 12 Overs. This brought the captain, Kane Williamson and Ross Taylor to the crease. Williamson Scored 57 and Taylor Scored 63. New Zealand finished their innings 265-8. Bangladesh were confident that they could win this game.

Bangladesh had a strong batting line-up with Tamim Iqbal, one of the highest rated ODI players in the world. He didn't get off to a good start and scored 0, also known as a "duck" to people who follow the game.

Most of the Bangladesh openers had failed to deliver. They lost 4 wickets for 33 runs. Then Shakib And Mahmudullah came to the crease. They built a partnership by picking up runs and rotating the strike. The "bad ball" was also put away for a boundary. A 224-run partnership followed and won Bangladesh the game by 5 wickets.

The Bangladesh fans were very lively and helped their team over the line in a keenly fought contest that was enjoyed by all due to the fine cricket on display.
