Humanities Department

Summer 2017 saw strong performance in Humanities subjects with over 70% of all pupils getting between an A* and C grade. Uptake at GCSE remains very strong with almost 100 students opting to take geography and 60 for history in year 10.

There has been an increase in the number of students opting to study multiple Humanities subjects at GCSE which is testament to the quality of teaching within the Faculty. Easter sees a Faculty trip to California with 88 students travelling to see geographical features such as the Grand Canyon, Death Valley, Yosemite and the Hoover Dam.
