## Response to Survey Questions

## Q: Do the levels affect the subjects you want to take?

* A: Yes, depending on your current levels will determine the most suitable subjects for Year 9, 10 and Year 11. Most subjects cover all students; however the colour coded diagram in the survey shows suitable learning pathways.

Q: Is Criminology an option? What is the subject media about?

* A: Criminology is not an option at the moment, if there is demand for a subject we do put on additional subjects, for example Psychology in 2015. The options evening will give you an opportunity to look at subjects and meet staff. You will need to find Mrs Jones in the Media room.


## Q: Do I have to do long Welsh course?

* A: All students will study 3 hours of Welsh in Key Stage Four. Most classes will take full course Welsh.

Q: How will the GCSE classes be set up? What if I cannot take an option for any reason? What if a subject that I want to do doesn't
run which would then affect my career? Can I change my options after I've chosen them?

* A: GCSE classes in the core subjects are set based on the levels achieved at the end of Year 9. Options subjects are mixed ability as a result of individual selection. Option subjects will run if there is demand for the subject in a specific option block. The class average for KS 4 subjects is 23 students (in 2014/15).
* If a subject does not run because of low numbers then the closet match will need to be sought and a review of your pathway can be undertaken.
* Once the confirmation of the subjects is made to parents, your options are fixed. This can be changed anytime up until September $1^{\text {st }}$ as long as there is space in a class. In September, we always run a two week reflection period where there is flexibility to move subject; again there must be space in the new class.

Q: Are the option choices the only subjects we will be studying alongside the default subjects?

* A: You will study Maths, English and Science as core subjects along with compulsory RE, Welsh, PE and PSE. In addition you will have to study the Welsh Baccalaureate.


## Response to Survey Questions

Q: Does separate science take up two GCSE options? I am in S but I don't want to do separate sciences, will it be compulsory? I feel that a compulsory separate science hampers my options.

* A: Separate science only takes up one option block (as all students take double award). There is not a need for students in S to take Separate Science and the advice for all students is to select subject that will best match your career choice.


## Q: What is the difference between BTEC sport and PE?

* A: The main difference between the two qualifications is the weighting of the coursework and examination focus which is reflected in the delivery style. You can discuss this further on the options evening with a member of the PE department.


## Q: If French wasn't available, is there any way I could study and take the GCSE exam outside of school?

* A: You can study any subject outside of school independently. There are issues completing the controlled assessments under supervision which causes the biggest issue. This can be discussed further if the need arises.


## Q: What if my preferred choice is not in my option block?

* A: Some of the most popular subjects run in more than one block which does help to create flexibility with all subjects. There is some movement during the options selection and I visit assemble weekly to discuss with groups of learners their choices and subject movement. If after this process has been completed and you still have a clash you will need to select an alternative.
